Whereas, in pursuance
of the Act of Congress, approved March 3, 1855, entitled "An Act
in addition to certain Acts granting Bounty Land to certain
Officers and Soldiers who have been engaged in the Military Ser-
vice of the United States," there has been deposited in the General
Land Office, Warrant N^o 8630 for 120 Acres, in favor of
Stephen Turner, a private in Captain Fulmer's Company
of Pennsylvania Militia, War of 1812, with evidence that
the same has been ^{actually} located upon the - West half of the South
East quarter, and the South East quarter of the South East
quarter, of Section Twenty three, in Township Seventy four
North of Range Twenty eight West, in the District of Lands
subject to sale at Chariton, Iowa, containing One hund-
red and twenty Acres, according to the Official plat of
the Survey of the said Land, returned to the General Land
Office by the Surveyor General, the said warrant having
been assigned by the said Stephen Turner to David Fisher,
in whose favor said tracts have been located.

Now know ye, That there is therefore granted by the
United States ~~to~~ the said David Fisher, as assignee as
aforesaid and to his heirs, the tracts of Land above described;

To have and to hold the said tracts of Land, with the appurte-
nances thereof, unto the said David Fisher, as assignee as aforesaid,
and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof, I,
Franklin Pierce, President of the United States of Amer-
ica, have caused these Letters to be made Patent, and
the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

fifteenth day of December in the year of our Lord one
thousand eight hundred and fifty six, and of the Independ-
ence of the United States the Eighty first.
